- About the Congress: The Congress of the Humanities and Social Sciences is the largest multidisciplinary academic gathering in Canada.
- Congress 2012 is organized by the Canadian Federation for the Humanities and Social Sciences
- Theme: "Crossroads: Scholarship for an Uncertain World"
- **Participants:** Between 6,000 8,500 researchers and graduate students and 70 academic associations from across Canada and around the world.
- **Location:** Congress 2012 is co-hosted by Wilfrid Laurier University and the University of Waterloo in Kitchener-Waterloo from **May 26 to June 2**.
- This is the first year in its 81-year history that the Congress of the Humanities and Social Sciences has been held in Kitchener-Waterloo.
- Last year, Congress was held in Fredericton, New Brunswick and co-hosted by the University of New Brunswick and St. Thomas University.
- Next year, Congress is being hosted by the University of Victoria.
- Organization: The Congress co-chairs are Douglas Peers, Dean of Arts at the University of Waterloo, and Michael Carroll, Dean of Arts at Wilfrid Laurier University.
- The Congress academic co-convenors are Eleanor Ty (Wilfrid Laurier University) and James Skidmore (University of Waterloo).
